from The Principal's Pen.....

Dear Parents and Caregivers

Our school prides itself on providing quality learning for all our students. We set high expectations of our students; of their effort in their learning, their behaviour and commitment to being the best person they can be behaviorally, socially, academically and emotionally.

Teachers link learning to real life activities so student embed the learning and the associated experiences into both short and long term memory. This has been very evident in recent weeks with our Year 2 students attending an excursion to the Historical Museum. Our Year 3 students are also off to the Museum next week, and our Year 1 students hosted a Mother's Day morning. Throughout these activities I have been impressed with the support shown by our parent community and the effort students have shown to engage with the learning linked to these learning excursions.



I would like to thank the Year 1 teachers who invited me to their Mother's Day pampering, where I was fortunate enough to have my fingers painted, my shoulders rubbed, a beautiful necklace made for me and given an iced biscuit with 100s and 1000s and stars on it to carry my dreams and wishes. In talking with the students all could tell me what made their mum special and all the things they love about their mum. Thank you to the mums who joined with me to be pampered. These special times, live for a long time in our memories as we watch our children grow and mature.

High Expectations for Behaviour of our Students

Every year marketing organizations release items that students want their parents to buy. On many occasions, they are marketed as 'must haves' for our children to grow and learn. This is not something new! I remember trying to beat my brother to the Weetbix box to get the cricket or football cards in the box, so I could swap them with my friends. Today there are many things to collect that children like to trade – marvel tokens are the current fad! I have enjoyed having tokens to give students as rewards however, recently they have been the cause of physical violence in our school and have disturbed the learning in the classrooms, to the extent that serious learning time has been lost.

Why is this happening? Just like I did in my childhood, these tokens are swapped by our students however, the ownership of these swapped or dropped tokens is often the cause for dispute. Disputes begin verbally and end physically. We now have some new 'gadgets' entering our school in the form of Beyblades and Fidgets. I have researched these items with marketing stating they are good for concentration and are necessary for students to improve concentration.

I cannot support or disagree with the marketing of the items, however, if students do need these items, they need to come to the school accompanied by a letter from an Occupational Therapist, Psychologist or a doctor. Without this supporting documentation they will not be permitted in our school as they are the cause of physical and verbal violence in our school.

Parents please note that due to an increase in physical violence being recorded at our school, students are not to bring Marvel Tokens, Beyblades and Fidgets to school. If found at school, they will be collected by the staff and will remain with the teacher until 3 o'clock. If this behaviour is repeated, they will be confiscated for the week and returned to parents via administration.

If, as stated earlier the fidget is recommended by an Occupation Therapist, Psychologist or a medical practitioner, a letter to the school will allow the student to have this item with them as these professionals are explicit in stating when the student needs the support and the purpose of the support which the school can then accommodate.

Please support the school with our quest to have high behavioral expectations of our students as we continue to teach and model appropriate methods of dealing with conflict, disappointments and dissatisfaction.

LEARNING NUMBER FACTS

MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL...

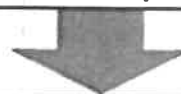
MOBILE PHONES!!

Our school has a very clear process for having a mobile phone at school. This process is endorsed by the P&C and is in place to ensure the safety of all students, and to prevent loss or theft of the phone.

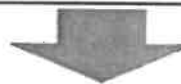
Unfortunately, some of our students have made the choice to keep their phones with them in their bag. This has resulted in a phone being stolen from the school bag and photos of students being taken without the student's permission or knowledge.

Students have been reminded of our school process and I would like to remind our community of our process so that our students are well supported with bringing a mobile phone to school.

- When students arrive at school, they take their phone to the aides room and 'sign' the phone in. They record their name and phone in the register.



- At 3 o'clock when the bell goes, they sign their phone out, and collect the phone from the teacher aide in the teacher aides room.



If phone is not handed in to the aide's room, teachers will remind the student to:

- hand the phone in
- keep the phone and bring it to the aides room
- or ring admin to collect the phone, who will ring the parent and ask them to collect the phone from admin that afternoon.

CURRICULUM NEWS - DELIGHTFUL DISPLAYS

Displays have the ability to create a rich environment that is both engaging and welcoming - displays can be bright and colourful or scientific and intriguing - either way, if they are done correctly they can really influence children's learning. Classroom aesthetics: Classroom displays can play a huge role in the aesthetics of a room and therefore transform it into the ideal working environment for young children.

Tell about the class: The type of displays in place in the classroom will also outline what kind of teacher and the specific style of teaching. Displays also work really well to allow students to understand what is expected of them - if there is a bright, fun display board with key learning objectives highlighted then it is both fun and informative.

Learn through creativity: Display boards also give the opportunity to teach a class through the art of creation. By decorating the boards with the class they will feel a great deal more involved in the overall project and remember the information that is taught them.

Create a sense of belonging: A sense of belonging is really important in any classroom, especially in primary school. If each student has at least one piece of their work on the wall then they will feel more at home in the classroom. This promotes a sense of pride and team spirit which is essential in any class.

Different types of wall displays:

A decorative display: This display is merely decorative to bring a touch of brightness and colour to the overall room. This in itself can have a huge impact on student's learning and motivation.

A "set the scene" display: When beginning a brand new topic, a new display board can be the perfect solution to helping students get to grip with the subject. For example, if the new topic is the Goldfields you can place a display board up of the local goldfields surrounded by key facts the students should remember.

A stimulating display: The idea of a "natural table" can work really well in classrooms, especially when used with a book open at an interesting page. This will encourage students to read the book as they are passing by.

A teaching aid display: This is the perfect solution if a new country is being studied in Geography as the entire display can have objects and accents that are typical of that new country.

A reference material display: If the class is learning the alphabet or times tables, this kind of display is ideal. Here, having the alphabet in colourful letters or numbers arranged helps pupils remember them.

A class management display: Displays can create a team spirit which is important to promote friendships being made. In the same way, displays can also work to mark the certain responsibilities of students on particular days.

A progress display: A progress display noting the number of gold stars each child has been awarded can really improve motivation, while also allowing each child to be congratulated on their hard work.

Displays are a really important part of learning for children of all ages, so teachers use them to get the very best from your class this term.

Come and take a look at the displays around the school....begin at the foyer and work your way to your child's classroom!
